# Junior Fair Organizations

4-H

4-H is a voluntary, educational program designed to meet the needs and interests of all boys and girls. Project members are at least age 8 years old and enrolled in 3rd grade as of January 1 of the current year. Cloverbuds are part of the non-competitive programs. They are youth at least 5 years old and in kindergarten through 8 years old and in the second grade. Ohio 4-H memberships ends December 31 of the year in which an individual attains the age of 19. Membership begins when an eligible individual is enrolled in a club or group that is under the direction of a trained adult and within the scope of Ohio State University Extension. The purpose of 4-H is to provide learning experiences and opportunities for boys and girls which will help them grow and develop to the fullest of their potential.

#### FFA

The goal of the FFA is to prepare students in agricultural education programs for leadership and careers in the science, business and technology of agriculture. Through FFA, you will have a chance to make money – your own money! With the cash comes responsibility and independence. FFA will give you a chance to prove yourself to your friends, to your parents, and to yourself through leadership and communication skills as you develop self-confidence and respect. Today's FFA offers an endless variety of activities and competitive programs for you and your friends. It all begins at school by enrolling in an agricultural education course which will provide experiences in a wide range of areas, from horticulture and natural resources to animal science and agri-business.

# Camp Fire

Camp Fire USA is a multi-service organization providing a variety of programs for youth in kindergarten through high school, and their families. These programs include clubs, camping, and environmental programs, self-reliance courses, and youth leadership, - Teens in action.

# Junior Achievement

Junior Achievement of Hancock County gives local high school students the opportunity to own and operate their own business. Junior Achievement is supported by local business and individuals.

## **FCCLA**

The goal of Family Career Community Leaders of America is to help youth assume their roles in society through home economics education in the areas of personal growth, family life, vocational preparation, and community involvement. This stated goal is the same for vocational home economics programs and the student organization: thus Family Career Community Leaders of America is a co-curricular rather than an extra-curricular activity. As such, Family Career Community Leaders of America has a definite role in the curriculum through in-class and extended class activities. Integration of Family Career Community Leaders of America into the curriculum is the responsibility of the home economics teachers, local and state home economics supervisors and teacher-educators.

## **Boy Scouts**

Boy Scouts of America by forming "partnerships" with community organizations serve youth and families. Cub Scouting (first through fifth grades) – "Fun with a Purpose." Under adult leadership, the Cub Scout learns cooperation at home and in the community. Boy Scouting (ages 11 through 17) – "Learning by Doing." Boy Scouting promotes personal fitness, character, development, and good citizenship. Exploring (co-ed age 15 through 20) – "Adult-like Activities." Explores with adult guidance planned activities that promote responsibility, leadership, social awareness, career exploration, personal fitness, outdoor fun, and service to others.

#### Girl Scouts

Girl Scouts is an organization providing various programs for youth through high school. These youth advance through individual troops which include educational and creative activities, community and service programs, and local and state participation, communication skills focusing on the development of mature young adults.

Hancock County Junior Fair Board Constitution and By-Laws

Article I - Name

Section 1.

The name of the organization shall be the Hancock County Junior Fair Board and shall hereafter be known as the Junior Fair Board.

Article II - Purpose

Section 1.

The purpose of the Junior Fair Board shall be to encourage youth work in the county through year round activities and to promote participation at the Hancock County Fair.

Article III – Membership and Organization Section 1.

The members shall be selected by submitting a completed Junior Fair Board Application form. Each applicant must be a member of a Hancock County Junior Fair organization. Acceptance and membership to the board is an agreement to complete the rules and responsibilities of the Junior Fair Board.

#### Section 2.

At the time of selection and during the term of office each Junior Fair Board member must be actively enrolled in one (1) or more: FFA, FCCLA, 4-H, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire, or Junior Achievement.

#### Section 3.

The member must be a 8th grader, Freshman, Sophomore, or Junior at the time of selection.

# Section 4.

Members shall serve a twelve (12) month term beginning November 1. The board will consist of no more than forty (40) members and the number of new members selected each year will be enough to maintain the board. Approved Second-Term applicants will fill all vacancies first. Applicants not selected will be rated as Alternates and may be asked to fill a vacated position.

#### Section 5.

A Second Term member may reapply once they have completed a twelve (12) month term successfully. The Second Term member will serve (if selected) a twenty-four (24) month term beginning November 1. A Third Term could also be served by those members who choose to apply after they are out of high school but are still within the 4-H age. Applications must be picked up and submitted to the Jr. Fair Office by appointed date. A committee will evaluate Second-Term applications. This committee shall be appointed by the Jr. Fair Coordinator and shall include at least one person not associated with the Jr. Fair Office.

#### Section 6.

A formal application for membership from each applicant must be submitted to the Junior Fair Coordinator by September 29, with a possibility of interviews being held prior to the beginning of the term. A committee of the Junior Fair Coordinator, two (2) Junior Fair Board members, one (1) Senior Fair Board member and one (1) Extension member, will meet and either approve or disapprove the applicants. The formal application shall be signed by the applicant and a parent or guardian.

#### Section 7.

The Junior Fair Coordinator and the Junior Fair Board Selection Committee are to appoint applicants to be recommended to the Senior Fair Board for approval and vacancies to be

filled. The appointment shall be for the unexpired term and shall serve till the next annual selection.

#### Section 8.

All Members must attend 8 out of 10 meetings and 20 hours worth of Junior Fair Board work days prior to fair and 20 hours during fair. Any member missing 2 meetings unexcused by the Junior Fair Coordinator, shall have their name placed before the Junior Fair Board for a discussion of removal from the board. After two missed meetings (excused or unexcused) time must be made up to the Junior Fair Coordinator at one hour per missed meeting.

#### Section 9.

Meetings shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

#### Article IV - Officers

Section 1.

Officers of the Junior Fair Board shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, and Reporter. Any person nominated shall have served on the Junior Fair Board at least one (1) year, except those nominated to fill the position of assistant secretary. Officers shall be selected by Secret Ballot with the nominee dismissed from the voting. Only persons in attendance at the meeting may be elected to an office. The meeting for re-organization shall be held after the closing of the annual fair at the November meeting.

## Article V - General Rules

Section 1.

Representatives of the Junior Fair Board may attend the Annual Ohio Fair Managers Convention as delegates from the Hancock County Junior Fair Board.

#### Section 2.

Management of the Junior Fair shall be the responsibility of the Junior Fair Coordinator, the Junior Fair Board, subject to the approval of the Senior Fair Board.

Hancock County Junior Fair Rules and Regulations

# Eligibility and Entries

Section 1.

All exhibitors in Junior Fair Division must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade, and no older than 18 as of January 1st, current year. They must be regularly enrolled members of a FFA/Agricultural Education Department, FCCLA/Home Economics Department, Art Department, and Industrial Arts/Technology Department of the Hancock County School System, or a Hancock County 4-H Club, or a Boy Scout, Girl Scout, Camp Fire USA, Junior

Achievement Organization. Exhibits may only be made in the area and class that pertains to the project carried.

## Section 2.

YOUTH PAVILION - All **Education Exhibits** must be brought to the Building from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday before the fair, with the exception of baked goods, crops and vegetables, which must be in place by 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, first day of the Fair.

YOUTH PAVILION - All <u>4-H Exhibits</u> must be in place by 5:00 p.m. Sunday prior to opening of the fair. Building hours prior to the Fair will be: Friday 9:00- 4:00 PM, Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Release time for Junior Fair Exhibits in the Youth Pavilion will be Monday 12:00-3:00 p.m. and Tuesday, the day following the Fair, 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. If a project leaves the building before 12 p.m. on Monday, then the exhibitor cannot participate in showing anything in the building the following year.

ALL JUNIOR FAIR ANIMALS MUST BE IN PLACE BY 8:00 P.M. Monday THE DAY PRIOR TO THE OPENING OF THE FAIR. Release is 12:00 p.m. Monday of the Fair.

## Section 3.

Each exhibitor will be allowed one (1) entry in each class, except in steers, swine, market lambs, dairy feeders and market goats where one (1) or two (2) may be entered and rabbits where a combination totaling six (6) entries are allowed except meat pens. Only one (1) meat pen may be entered.

## Section 4.

By agreement of State and County level the following rule governs projects in Agricultural Education and 4-H Club work. Exhibitors entered in the Junior Fair Division are eligible to exhibit the same kind of project in ONE (1) department, but are not eligible to exhibit same kind of project in same organization in more than one (1) county. The following are recognized by the Junior Fair Division as separate projects: Dairy Herd Management (cows in production), Dairy Heifer (not fresh), Dairy Feeders, Sheep Breeding, Commercial Market Lamb, Beef Breeding, Steers, Beef Feeders, Market Hogs (not part of the breeding liter), Saddle Horses, Ponies and Draft Horses.

# Section 5.

All livestock exhibitors are required to attend and complete a qualified Quality Assurance training session annually or complete the test out option (if age eligible) 45 days prior to the first day of the fair. If a livestock exhibitor fails to receive a proper Quality Assurance Certification 45 day prior to the first day of the fair, the exhibitor is not eligible to enter Junior Fair livestock entries or show animals in any Junior Fair livestock class.

Livestock exhibitors are required to submit a 'Drug Use Notification Form' (DUNF) for each market animal/pen and lactating animal prior to weigh-in. No DUNF – animal(s) will NOT be weighed. One (1) DUNF is required per animal except for market pens of 2 or 3 animals – then one (1) DUNF per pen.

First year livestock exhibitors and a minimum of one (1) parent/guardian are required to attend a Sportsmanship Clinic and sign the Sportsmanship Contact to be eligible to bring Junior Fair animals to the fair and/or show animals in any Junior Fair livestock class. All livestock exhibitors and their parents/guardians agree to abide by the Sportsmanship Contract in the year the contract is initially signed and all future years the exhibitor shows Junior Fair livestock at the fair.

#### Section 6.

All animals must enter the McCleary Gate on Fishlock Ave.

#### Premiums

Section 7.

All exhibits shall be judged on the A, B, and C basis. Livestock Exhibitors must complete project interview to show and sell.

## Section 8.

The Hancock County Agricultural Society will provide suitable ribbons and premium awards.

#### Section 9.

Ribbons will be awarded to all projects on basis of exhibit alone.

# Section 10.

All Junior Fair Exhibits must be housed in designated Junior Fair area to be eligible for Junior Fair premiums.

## Section 11.

Premiums will be paid on Final Grade:

Beef, Dairy, Dairy Feeders, Dogs, Draft Horses, Goats, Horses/Ponies, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine. A-\$5.00, B-\$4.00, C-\$3.00

# General Rules for Livestock

Section 13.

Livestock projects must have ownership by the following date of current year: Hancock County Calf Club, Market Steers, Dairy Steers – January 3 registered at January Tagging

Dairy Feeder Calves – no later than the first Saturday of April Beef Breeding & Beef Calves – June 1

Beef Feeder - August 1

Market Hogs - June 1

Market Lambs & Breeding Sheep - June 1

Goats - June 1

Horse/Pony - June 1

Meat Chickens - No earlier than five (5) to seven (7) weeks prior to first day of fair.

Meat Turkeys – June 1, hatched no earlier than April 15

Meat Ducks – No earlier then October 1 of previous year; No later than seven (7) weeks prior to the day of fair

Meat Geese - No earlier then October 1 of previous year; No later than sixteen (16) weeks prior to the day of fair

All Other Poultry - June 1

Dogs - June 1

Rabbits – All project animals by June 1 (except meat pens of 3) Meat Pens of (3) – Exhibitor must have at least one other project rabbit by June 1. The meat pen of three (3) in the exhibitors possession by August 1. All meat pens of 3 rabbits will be tattooed around August 1 and the numbers will be recorded.

#### Section 14.

All Junior Fair Exhibitors must be responsible for care, feeding and handling of livestock exhibits and area around exhibits. All Exhibitors are responsible for their own veterinary costs. Aisles will be inspected daily.

#### Section 15.

All livestock placed on exhibit are subject to official Health Regulations of the Veterinary Department of the State Department of Agriculture. Health Rules for livestock are given in detail in the Senior Division of the Premium Book.

# Section 16.

Each Exhibitor shall present registration papers to the person in charge of exhibits, except in market classes and certain 4-H Club and FFA projects.

## Section 17.

Hancock County Agricultural Society is not responsible for Health or Death of sick animal during or after the Fair.

## Section 18.

If Superintendents determine an animal requires veterinary care, it will be administered at EXHIBITOR'S EXPENSE. Authorization of release of Sick Animal will be determined by Dept. Superintendent, Veterinarian, Senior Fair Board member and Sale Committee and a release form must be signed by all parties.

## Section 19.

Release time for livestock is 12:00 p.m. Labor Day.

# Livestock Shows & Showmanship Section 20.

In cases where the Junior Fair exhibitor has more than one (1) animal in the same class or cannot be present for the show, the handler must be a Hancock County Junior Fair Exhibitor. If a person has two animals that fall into the same weight class, the heavier of the two animals may be bumped up to the next heavier weight class. Talk to the superintendent of your barn.

#### Section 21.

All Junior Fair exhibitors are required to perform hands-on grooming on their own animal at the Hancock County Fair with the assistance from advisor, family members, or another Hancock County Junior Fair exhibitor. Any exhibitor in violation of this rule will forfeit the right to sell their livestock through the sale ring on Sale Day and animal will go base bid at the discretion of the Junior Fair Committee.

## Section 22.

Animals used in the showmanship class must be the contestant's own project exhibited in the Junior Fair, current year.

## Section 23.

Exhibitor must be present during their specific showmanship class to be eligible for any placing awards and/or Showman to Showmen contest When Showmanship classes are divided according to age, the age of the exhibitor as of January 1, current year, will be used in determining which class the exhibitor enters.

#### Section 24.

Winners in the Showmanship Classes, except for Horses, Draft Horses, and Llamas, may not compete in that class the following year, but may compete in Previous Winners Class. Exhibitor may resume competition upon completion of year absent period. Previous Winner: any exhibitor having previously won a Showmanship Class including current year (Junior, Intermediate, or Senior)

## Section 25.

Premiums for livestock projects will be paid the day after the last species show during the fair 1 p.m. - 4 p.m. Wednesday- Sunday, Monday 10:00-2:00pm in the Junior Fair Office. Species that show more than 1 day have to wait till the entire species is done showing. Maximum amount paid per species will be \$40.00. The final pickup time for livestock premium money is 4:00 p.m. Monday, the final day of the fair, or premium will be forfeited. Showmanship classes are not paid a premium with the exception of the Horse Department.

## General Rules

#### Section 26.

No exhibitor or helpers shall stay overnight on the Fairgrounds except those staying with parents or with a permit issued and signed by proper authorities. Please check at the Sheriff's trailer for permits.

#### Section 27.

NO HOUSEHOLD FANS WILL BE ALLOWED IN LIVESTOCK BARNS AND TENTS.

## Section 28.

All exhibits must be in place by 8:00 p.m. the day before the Fair and remain until officially released.

# Tampering / Misrepresentation

Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, custody and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.

Rule 901:5-14 – Prohibition of stimulation or making appear more sound animals entered in competition. No Society shall permit an injection or administration:

- (a) of any drug of any kind or description, or the physical application of any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance, to stimulate any animal which is entered in any form of competition.
- (b) to any animal, or any material which will conceal the true conformation or condition of said animal, or make said animal more sound than it actually is.

Therefore, any artificial means of removing or remedying the physical defects or conformation on exhibition livestock, such as lifting or filling under the skin, including oil, water or any other foreign material, use of string artificial tail heads or heels, and altering the natural color of an animal, dehydration and re-hydration with the use of any form of electrolytes, etc. will be considered fraud and deception.

The use of any materials that are colder than fair tap water will not be allowed.

Any and all tampering will be determined by the department superintendent of the animal. The exhibitor may be asked to remove animal from the fairgrounds.

Feet of animal must be touching the surface of the show arena. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from competition at the Hancock County Junior Fair.

The use of any unapproved drugs is prohibited: Senior Fair Premium Book 959.05.

Penalties: Senior Fair Premium Book 959.99.

Protests: Senior Fair Premium Book (52).

'Drug Use Notification Form' must be completed for all Jr. fair animals online. DUNF "withdrawal by date" will be the

Monday 12 midnight prior to the fair. ALL animals must be drug free before weighing. No show, no sale.

# **LATE ENTRIES**

Deadline for entries is to be July 26, 2024 at Midnight
Advisors will be required to follow the July 26, 2024 at Midnight Deadline.
Up until August 5th at 5 p.m. (Livestock interviews) a \$50 per entry will be charged for any entries not previously entered through the Junior Fair.

## Exhibitor Information

#### Gallon of Milk:

One (1) gallon of milk will be sold from the Grand Champion female over all breeds. This money will be divided in half. One half will be shared by all Dairy Exhibitors based on the number of projects exhibited and shall be considered the Market Bid. The other half will be distrusted among those not selling any other species and will be considered the Premium Bid.

# Weighting Schedule:

The following weigh-ins are Monday, prior to the first day of the fair. Beef Feeders: following Dairy Steers after Opening Ceremonies

Dairy Feeders: 4:30 p.m. - 6:30 p.m.

Dairy Steers: after Opening Ceremonies (approx 8:00 p.m.)

Goats: 12:00 p.m. – 3:00 p.m. Lambs: 3:00 p.m. – 6:00 p.m.

Market Steers: following Dairy Steers after Opening Ceremonies

Poultry: 12:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.

Rabbit: 9:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. (as checked in to barn)

Swine: 7:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

# Weigh-in Rules:

- 1. There will be No re-weighing of Any Animals
- 2. All livestock projects must receive an A or B grade on the animal
- 3. Species specific rules:
- a. Dairy Feeders: less than 350# or greater than 699# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid
- b. Goats: less than 50# are ineligible for Sale Ring, may go home immediately or be marked Take Home
- Lambs: less then 90# or over 145# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid
- d. Chicken Pen of Three (3): each pen less than 13lb 8oz or greater than 21# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid
- e. Turkeys (singular market animals): less than 18# or over 30# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid

- f. Rabbits Pen of Three (3) of uniform animals per pen: any pen with any singular animal less than 3.5# or greater than 5.5# or younger than 10 weeks or older than 12 weeks in age is ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid.
- g. Swine: less than 215# or greater than 285# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid
- h. Beef Feeders- Acceptable weights will not be greater than 699# are ineligible for Sale Ring and must go Market Bid
- I. All other species not listed above no weight restrictions for Sale Ring

# Animal Destinations (Sale Ring, Market Bid, & Take Home):

- 1. All Market Livestock Exhibitors must go through the Sale Ring once and shall sell only one (1) animal. All animal destinations must be declared at weigh-in. Failure to properly designate Sale Ring, Market Bid, and/or Take Home animals will leave the decision to the discretion of the Sale Manager. If an exhibitor has a second animal of the same species, this animal will go to Market Bid or Take Home. If an exhibitor has animals in multiple species, one animal from each species must go to Market Bid but subsequent animals may go Market Bid or Take Home.
- 2. Exceptions:
- a. Grand and Reserve Champions will be sold and replace an exhibitors other projects destined for the Sale Ring. See Sale of Champions.
- b. Exhibitors with single entry in a non-terminal species of breeding animals may select to go Take Home, so long as another entry has been identified for the Sale Ring.
- c. Any exhibitor with multiple Grand and/or Reserve Champions will be required to take all Champion animals thru the Sale Ring.
- 3. All terminal market animals sold during the Premium Monday Sale are available for Home Bidding with the exception of Rabbits.

# Sale of Grand and Reserve Champions

- 1. Champion Swine, Steers, Lambs, & Goats will be removed from the grounds following the trip through the Livestock Sale by the processor designated by the Livestock Sale Committee and will be processed for ODA testing. For any Champion animal not purchased on Home Bid during Monday's sale the exhibitor will be responsible for the processing fees and carcass of their animal and should contact the processor selected by the Livestock Sale to provide a cut order. In this case, the exhibitor will only receive the Premium Bid, no Market Bid, from the sale.
- 2. Champion Rabbits and Poultry will go to the Market Bidder and the exhibitor will receive Premium and Market Bid from the Sale Ring.
- 3. Champion Dairy and Beef Feeders will go the winning bidder from Saturday's "Back-to-Farm" Market Sale and the exhibitor will receive Premium and Market Bid from the Sale Ring.
- Rate of Gain Winners are not considered champions and will follow the same expectations as the other remaining members of the Livestock Sale based on the species.

# Other Exhibitor Expectations:

- 1. Any exhibitor receiving an incomplete on their Livestock Interview will be ineligible to sell their livestock through the Sale Ring. Their projects must go Market Bid.
- 2. There is to be no buyer solicitation on Monday, Labor Day. Only members of the sale committee and/or Sale Office staff may have contact with the Auctioneers while "crying the sale".
- 3. Black chair seating and free refreshments are for our registered buyers. Help us keep them comfortable and keep sale costs down.
- 4. Any exhibitor not present when their animal is to be sold in the ring shall sell the animal at Market Bid unless arrangements have been made prior to the sale with the Department Superintendent.
- 5. No representation of placing from any other show or exhibition will be allowed during the sale. Violating this rule will result in forfeiture of the Premium Bid sale and the project will sell Market Bid only.
- 6. Proof of thanking your buyers will be required for check pick-up. Watch for additional information on this expectation. Also see the section below: Buyer Appreciation Poster Contest
- 7. Livestock Checks will be distributed in October during the Celebration of 4-H event. Watch for additional information.
- 8. Exhibitor checks must be deposited or cashed within 90 days of print date or will be voided. A \$30 fee will be assessed to reissue any Livestock Sale check.

# Hancock County Agricultural Society Responsibilities:

- 1. Department Superintendents will provide a Market Buyer or Market Price for their respective species to the Sale Manager no later than Friday at 4:30 p.m., will review the Sale Order no later than Saturday at 4:30 p.m., and will assist with preparing their department for the Livestock Sale. The Department Superintendent is the exhibitor's primary point of contact for questions.
- 2. The Livestock Sale Committee, Jr. Fair Board, and Sr. Fair board will assist with preparing the arena for the Sale Day, including by not limited to setting up equipment, tables, seating and refreshments, providing support personnel to the Sale Office including a check-in table sponsor, and arranging the auctioneers.
- 3. The Sale Office will be responsible for preparing the Sale Order sheets, collecting buyer registrations, clerking the sale, collecting buyer payments, and providing proper data for buyer recognition and exhibitor checks following the sale.

# Breakdown of Exhibitor Payout:

- 1. Exhibitor Checks will consist of Premium Bid, applicable Market Bid, and any Project Donations less the Sale Commission and any applicable Check-Off fees.
- a. Premium Bid: The amount called in the Sale Ring
- b. Market Bid: The amount bid for purchase of the actual animal; Market Bid (when applicable) will be listed on the Sale Sheets. The description of Market Bid for Dairy is found under the Gallon of Milk section above. The Market Bid for Feeders are determined by the

- "Back-to-Farm" Market Saturday Sale.
- c. Project Donations: Additional funds donated directly to a sale ring exhibitor in support of efforts to complete the project.
- d. Sale Commission is a 6% charge levied on all sales to be used by the Livestock Sale Committee for the associated costs of the sale and future improvements.
- e. Check-offs are fees collected by various species to bring awareness to the species.

# **Buyer Appreciation Poster Contest:**

- 1. All Jr. Fair Livestock Exhibitors shall display a poster above their pen by the close of the first day of the fair.
- 2. The poster shall be 14" x 22" only
- 3. The poster shall consist of a creative and attractive "Thank You" to their previous year's buyer.
- 4. Judging will be conducted by the Jr. Fair Office.
- 5. The top three (3) in each department will be displayed in the show arena on sale day.
- 6. A ribbon and financial aware will be provided to the winners from the Jr. Fair office.

# Feeders "Back-to-Farm" Saturday Sale: August 31, 2024

- 1. Dairy Feeder and Beef Feeder calves are sold individually. Designation is made to which calves immediately leave the grounds verse those departing after a trip thru the Premium Monday Sale.
- 2. Payment is required immediately following the conclusion of the sale. Payment of Cash, Check, or Credit Card will be accepted. Credit Card Payments will incur a 3% processing fee.

# Premium Monday Sale: September 2, 2024

- 1. Premium Bidding (White): This is the simplest way to participate in the Livestock Sale. As a Premium Bid Buyer, you are claiming no ownership or interest in the animal and will responsible only for the final call amount of the auctioneer (the Premium).
- 2. Premium Plus Home Bidding (Yellow): In this type of bidding, you are claiming ownership of the animal. All animals available for home bidding are terminal (no "Back-To-Home" animals on Monday) and a home bid hauter/processor must already be established at the time of purchase. You will be responsible for the final call amount of the auctioneer (the Premium) as well as the Market Price of the animal listed in the Sale Program.

- 3. Premiums will be round numbers and the winning bid will be a flat amount. Premium plus the listed Market Price will go directly to the exhibitor minus commission, administrative, check-off, or other fees that may apply.
- 4. All Buyers will receive recognition in the Sale Ring, local newspaper, and in the following year's fair book publication. Buyers of Grand and Reserve Champions will be featured in our post-fair Livestock Sale feature in the local paper and on our website.
- 5. Payment is expected on the date of the purchase unless prior arrangement has been made with the Sale Office. Payment of Cash, Check, or Credit Card will be accepted. Credit Card Payments will incur a 3% processing fee.
- 6. Late Payments (not received within 30 days of the Livestock Sale) will incur a 2% late fee. Failure to settle the Livestock Buyer account before October 30th, 2024 will result in the Buyer being ineligible to participate in the 2025 Livestock Sale.

# All Buyers:

- 1. All Buyers must be registered (either online or at the Sale Office) prior to participation in the Livestock Sale.
- 2. Buying Groups consist of registered Buyers who wish to consolidate/collaborate their livestock sale buying activities. Each participating individual or organization in the Group will also be registered and assigned a Buyer ID to allow for proper billing.
- 3. All Buyers who participated in the previous year's sale or newly registered before July 30th will receive a buyer information package on or before August 15. The package will include fair admission information, a schedule of activities, and any updates to policies or procedures.

## Bid Allocation Card (BAC):

- 1. Bid Allocation Cards (BAC) are only eligible for purchase of Grand and Reserve Champions and Gallon of Milk. The minimum bid to participate on a BAC is \$200,00.
- 2. All participating Buyers must be a registered Buyer and have a Buyer ID listed. Each participating Buyer will be billed the amount listed on the BAC.
- 3. A registered Buyer must be listed at the top of the BAC and is considered the Head Buyer for the BAC. BACs without a Head Buyer will be rejected at the time of sale. The Head Buyer accepts responsible for Premium bid and will be billed in the event any BAC participate rejects the associated premium assigned from the BAC.

## Project Donors:

- 1. Project Donations provide an option to contribute financially to any exhibitor participating in the livestock sale, regardless of a Donors ability to attend the Livestock Sale.
- 2. Project Donations will be accepted through September 6th, 2023.
- 3. Project Donations can be submitted via the online form or in person at the Sale Office during the fair and are accepted in any amount over \$5.
- 4. Payment is required when the Project Donation is submitted. Exceptions can be made for Premium Monday Sale byers. Payment of Cash, Check, or Credit Card will be accepted. Credit Card Payments will incur a 3% processing fee

- 5. Project Donors are not considered Livestock Sale Buyers and are not eligible for Grand and Reserve photos.
- 6. Project Donations are accepted for exhibitors participating in the livestock sale only. Any Project Donations submitted for exhibitors excluded from the sale will be considered a general donation to the Sale Committee and used for future improvements.

 Large Animal: The Senior Showmanship winner from each of the following species will be allowed to participate: Beef, Dairy, Dairy Feeder, Draft Horse, Light Horse, Sheep, Swine, Boer Goat and Dairy Goat.

Small Animal: The Senior Showmanship winner from each of the following species will be allowed to participate: Rabbit, Chicken, Waterfowl, Turkey and Canine.

- a. There will be only (1) exhibitor per participating specie.
- b. Department winner will not compete in his/her department division of the contest.
- c. Large and small animal shows will run concurrently, rotating between large and small animal specie.
- d. If a participant wins both a large specie and small specie, the exhibitor must choose only one specie to represent.
- 2. If the winner of the Sr. Showmanship class (in their specie) is not willing or able to compete in the contest, they should notify the Department Superintendent of that specie, at the time of selection, so that the next place winner may participate. The Department Superintendent will notify the SOS Director and Jr. Fair Coordinator at that time to notify them of the change.
  - a. If the second-place winner is not willing or able to participate, the third-place winner will be asked.
  - b. If the third-place winner is not willing or able, that specie will be shown, but will forfeit their right to be represented in Showman of Showman.

- 3. Questions may be asked by the judges in the show ring. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to gain as much knowledge about the specie they are showing.
- 4. Judges are allowed up to 15 minutes of judging per class.
- 5. Final selection will be on point basis and individual scoring results will be available to any participant after the show, upon request.
- 6. In case of a tie, an animal specie will be brought in, at random, for a tie breaker.
  - a. Large animal tie will show a Small animal
  - b. Small animal tie will show a Large animal
- 7. The Overall winner, in their respective class (Large or Small Animal) will receive a platter. All participants will receive a participation award.
- 8. Judges' decision is final.
- 9. When a participant is declared as the winner in the large or small animal divisions, the participant will no longer be eligible to participate in their respective division in Showman of Showmen events in the future.
  - a. If a participant is declared the winner of the small animal division, they may no longer compete in the small animal division.
  - b. If a participant is declared the winner of the large animal division, they may no longer compete in the large animal division.

- Anyone enrolled in a Hancock County 4-H Club or is a Hancock County Vo-Ag student is eligible to secure steers or beef breeding animals and participate in the Jr. Show.
- 2. An exhibitor may show a maximum of two (2) steers per beef steer show, (Market Steers, Hancock County Calf Club Steers, and Dairy Steers), in the Junior Fair Beef Department.
- 3. A steer can only show in one beef class.
- 4. All steers must be registered with the Hancock County Agricultural Society at the January tagging.

Each animal must be tagged in 2023 or 2024. No exceptions to this rule.

- 5. Steers will be weighed on a bonded scale. Weigh-in for show and sale will be Monday night following the Dairy Steers at the Steer Barn scales.
- 6. All steers exhibited must have been dropped after January 1 of the previous year. Steers will be mouthed in case of doubt, (no permanent teeth).

- 7. Any steer sold at the sale must have been shown. In the case where an animal is too difficult to handle, a decision is to be made by the Superintendent as to whether it will be allowed to show and/or sell in the arena.
- 8. No horns will be permitted on steers.
- 9. No bulls shall be allowed to come on the Fairgrounds unless controlled by the owner and brought at his/her own risk.
- 10. Exhibitors must notify Superintendent immediately following Show of any decision to take home steers for slaughter.
  - One (1) Junior Fair Market animal must sell through the sale.

 Dairy feeders must be purebred, dehorned, and surgically castrated males from one of the following five (5) dairy breeds: Holstein, Brown Swiss, Jersey, Ayrshire, or Guernsey.

No dairy crossbred or beef cattle crosses will be permitted.

- 2. Calves shall be in the possession of the Junior Fair Exhibitor no later than the first Saturday of April of the current year.
- 3. Dairy feeders are to be dehorned and castrated by June 1.
- Mandatory tagging, vaccination and weigh-in will take place on June 6, 2024,
   6:00pm 9:00pm in the Buckeye Building.
  - a. Exhibitors may tag four (4) calves and show two (2) at the Dairy Feeder Show.
  - b. Three (3) third party evaluators will examine dairy feeders at the mandatory June tagging to determine breed eligibility. If determined to be ineligible, the exhibitor may:
    - i. Finish out the 4-H project but will not bring the animal to the Fair.
    - ii. Pay for DNA testing to confirm that the animal is purebred at the exhibitors expense. Tissue samples will be taken at the June weigh-in and handled according to the protocol laid out in the Jr. Fair Office.
- 5. Fair weigh-in will take place on Monday, prior to the fair, 4:30pm 6:30pm. Acceptable weights will be not less than 350# or greater than 699#.
  - a. Animals outside of that range will be allowed to show on Show Day in the over/under class but will not be eligible for the Championship Drive or be taken through the premium sale.
  - b. Light/heavy calves will otherwise be subject to the same take home/base bid auction options as other animals.
- 6. Each exhibitor must show and be responsible for his or her animal unless excused by the Superintendent for sickness or other justifiable reason. Animals must be halter broke.
- 7. Exhibitors must abide by the Hancock County Junior Fair Rules and Regulations. Please review those rules and regulations in this publication.
- 8. Show sticks are required to be used while showing all dairy feeders.
- 9. Classes for the show will be determined by weight at the discretion of the department superintendent.
- 10. If the superintendent determines an animal requires veterinary care, it will be administered at the exhibitor's expense.
- 11. As per Hancock County Jr. Fair Rules and Regulations, General Rules for Livestock, Section 27. No household fans will be allowed in livestock barn. Three prong (grounded) plug required.
- 12. Grand & Reserve Champion Dairy Feeders will be subject to urine sample collection immediately following the show for banned substance testing.

- 5. Dairy Feeders must be a Dairy Beef Cross, dehorned and Castrated steers
- 6. Mandatory tagging, Vaccination and weigh- in of dairy feeders will take place on June 6, 2024 from 6-9pm.

### 7. Show Sticks are Required

- 8. Each exhibitor must show and be responsible for his or her animal unless excused by the superintendents for sickness or other justifiable reason. Animals must be halter broke.
- 9. Exhibitors are required to perform hands on grooming on their own animals [refer to general rules for livestock, section 2.1]
- 10. No household fans, must have 3 pronged plug. Industrial grade only.
- 11. If superintendent determines an animal requires veterinary care, it will be administer at EXHIBITOR'S EXPENSE.
- 12. Classes for show will be determined by weight at the discretion of the sale committee and superintendents.
- 13. Exhibitors must abide by the Jr. Fair Rules and Regulations, Codes of Practice, Code of Ethics, and Tampering/ Misrepresentation Rules. Dehydration and re-hydration with the use of any form of electrolytes is prohibited.
- 14. Any and all tampering will be determined by the department superintendent. The Exhibitor may be asked to remove animal from the fairgrounds.

- 2. Each exhibitor will be allowed one (1) entry in each class. (See Rules & Regulations, Section 3)
- 3. All heifers must be in place Monday night before the start of the Fair; All cows must be in place by 8 a.m. Tuesday. Cows will be permitted to go home immediately following the show with the exception of the Supreme Champion Cow which must remain until the conclusion of the fair. Heifers must remain at the fair until the conclusion of the fair and released by the Director in Charge.

Showmanship Classes conducted first in the following order:

Senior Showmanship-age 14 and over

Junior Showmanship-age 13 and under

Super Showmanship-All previous winners

- 4. Animals used in showmanship must be a part of exhibitor's project.
- 5. Winners of Showmanship classes may not compete in that class the following year, but may compete in the Super—Showmanship Class. Exhibitor may resume competition upon completion of year absent period. The person who received first place in the senior showmanship will sit out the following year as well as the showman of showmen representative if it was not the first place winner.
- 6. All previous winners (including current year) are eligible to compete in Super Showmanship.

 Show order will be by age from youngest to oldest, rotating breeds in alphabetical order (as follows): Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, and Milking Shorthorn, Mix Dairy Breed.

### Jr Fair Light Horse Department Rules 2024

As approved by majority vote by Joint Meeting of Jr Fair Horse & 4H Horse Council on 2/9/24

### **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

- A. Qualifying Championships (Showmanship, Pleasure, Horsemanship/Eq). [See Chart 1]
  - a. Exhibitors placing 1<sup>st</sup> through 3<sup>rd</sup> are automatically qualified to come back in for the Championship class.
    - i. If an exhibitor has place 1st-3rd in any other class that qualifies into the same championship (Please refer to Chart 1) exhibitor must declare which qualifying class they will be representing in the championship
      - 1. EX: Exhibitor A qualifies in both English Pleasure and Western Pleasure with the same Horse. Exhibitor must turn in *Declaration Form\** for animal identifying whether they will be showing English or Western.
    - ii. After an Exhibitor has declared which qualifying class they will be representing for the Championship, the next highest placing from the class Exhibitor chose NOT to represent will be eligible for the Championship Class.
      - 1. This applies down to 6<sup>th</sup> place. No exhibitors lower than 6<sup>th</sup> place will be eligible to participate in the Championship class.
      - 2. EX: Exhibitor A qualified in both English Pleasure & Western Pleasure. Exhibitor A chooses to represent English Pleasure for Championships. The 4<sup>th</sup> place exhibitor from Western Pleasure is now eligible to enter the Championship. This exhibitor must now turn in a *Declaration Form*\*
    - iii. If an exhibitor has qualified for a Championship Class with more than one animal, exhibitor MUST DECLARE which animal they will be showing in the Championship Class and which qualifying class they will be representing by turning in a *Declaration Form*\* to the office by the deadline.
      - 1. EX: Exhibitor qualified in Sr Western Showmanship and Gaited Showmanship with two different animals. Exhibitor must turn in a Designation form\* for BOTH ANIMALS. One will indicate that that animal A is not showing, and the other will indicate Animal B is showing and what qualifying class that animal will represent.

### b. CHAMPIONSHIP PATTERNS

i. Championship patterns will be posted at 8PM on evening of the fair along with the final list of Qualifiers for each Showmanship Championship Class.

### B. SENIOR SHOWMANSHIP CHAMPIONSHIP SPECIFIC CIRCUMSTANCES

- a. The Sr. Showmanship Championship is the selection process for the Showman of Showman for the year as the Sr Showmanship Champion will represent the Light Horse Department in the competition.
  - i. All Sr Showman must have an opportunity to QUALIFY to the championship, therefore Youth between the ages of 14-18 that are exhibiting in classes that are not eligible for Qualifying Championships in any other circumstance ARE eligible for the Sr Showmanship Championship.
  - ii. EX: Exhibitors who are 14-18 as of January 1<sup>st</sup> in the following classes are eligible to qualify to Sr Showmanship Championship under specific circumstances (See section B(b))
    - 1. Pony Showmanship
    - 2. Small Equine Showmanship

- 3. Sr Ranch Showmanship
- b. In classes that would not normally be eligible for Qualifying Championships (see Section B(a)(ii) ) Senior Exhibitors are only eligible IF:
  - i. Exhibitor places 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup> in their respective class OR
  - ii. Exhibitor places 4<sup>th</sup>, but one of the higher placing SENIOR exhibitors has chosen to represent another qualifying class
    - 1. 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup> place exhibitors are only eligible if there are no Jr Exhibitors placing between them and the next highest Senior Exhibitor
  - iii. EX: Exhibitor A & B are Seniors and place 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> in Pony Showmanship. A Jr Exhibitor places 3<sup>rd</sup>. Exhibitor C places 4<sup>th</sup>.
    - 1. Exhibitor C is only eligible to enter the Championship class if either Exhibitor A or B opts to represent another qualifying class.
  - iv. EX 2: Exhibitor A, B & C are all Senior exhibitors. If Exhibitor A chooses to represent another qualifying class in the Championship, another Senior exhibitor is only qualified if they are placed next consecutively without any Jr Exhibitors between them.
    - If Exhibitor A and B choose another qualifying class to represent. The 4<sup>th</sup> place exhibitor, Exhibitor D who is a senior exhibitor is Qualified for the Championship. 5<sup>th</sup> is a Jr Exhibitor, therefore the Sr Exhibitor in 6<sup>th</sup> place is not eligible for Championships.

### c. Showman of Showmen

- i. Sr Showmanship Champion will be the representative from the Light Horse Department for Showman of Showmen.
  - 1. The same exhibitor can NOT represent the department two years in a row.
    - EXCEPTION If the Reserve Champion and Third Place winner are unable or unwilling to be the Light Horse Department Representative.
      - i. Only then can the same exhibitor represent the Light Horse Department 2 years in a row.
  - 2. An exhibitor CAN represent the Light Horse Department more than once, just not two years in a row (excepting the situation in B(c)(i)(1)(a).
- ii. Sr Showmanship Champion must turn in the Showman of Showman exhibitor packet to the Superintendent no later than 8 pm Thursday of fair week.
- ili. Sr Showmanship Champion must complete and turn in their Certificate of Training no later than 10pm Saturday evening the day before Showman of Showmen. Failing to do so will allow the next eligible Showman (section B(e)(i)(1)(a) eligible provided they have turned in their Certificate of Training.
- iv. Showman of Showmen representative must make their animal available for use in the Showman of Showmen contest.

### C. POINT CHAMPIONSHIPS

- a. Point Championships awarded based on points accumulated in contributing classes as listed. [Please see CHART 2]
- b. Points are awarded to exhibitors based on their placings in each respective class.
  - i. First place will be awarded points equal to the number of exhibitors that competed in the class, not to exceed 6 points.
  - ii. Classes will be placed 1st 6th

- iii. Exhibitors who enter the ring and show, but are disqualified will still count as an exhibitor when determining points earned by the exhibitors who place in the class.
- iv. EX: There are 8 entries in Barrels. Only 6 exhibitors actually enter the arena to make a run. The maximum number of points awarded to 1<sup>st</sup> place would be 6 points.
  - 1. If one of those exhibitors has a no-time or is otherwise disqualified, the winner of the class would still receive 6 points.
  - 2. If only 5 exhibitors entered the arena to show, the maximum number of points awarded to 1<sup>st</sup> place would be reduced to 5 points.

### c. Contesting Championship

- i. Tie breaker class will rotate based on the year, with rotation to start over in 2027.
  - 1. 2024 Keyhole
    - 2. 2025 Barrels
    - 3. 2026 Stakes
    - 4. 2027 Pole Bending

### d. Pony Championship

- Ponies must be 58" and under.
  - 1. 4H Members must have a 4H Pony Card and meet requirements for gaining card as established by the Hancock Co OSU Extension office.
  - 2. Non-4H Members must make arrangements with the department superintendent to be measured on fair Move in day before 8PM.
- ii. Pony championship will be based on points earned in specific classes. [See Chart 2]
  - 1. Horsemanship/equitation will be the tie-breaker class.
- iii. General pony rules
  - 1. Ponies must show pony all day,
    - a. EX: Exhibitor cannot enter Pony pleasure and Western Pleasure/Ranch Pleasure/English pleasure with the same animal.
  - 2. Exhibitors can still enter non-height based classes
    - a. Non-height based classes = anything other than
       Equitation/Horsemanship, Showmanship, and/or Pleasure.

### e. Walk/Trot Championships

- i. Two championships will be awarded -
  - 1. 1st Year Walk-Trot
  - 2. 2<sup>nd</sup> Year Walk-Trot
- ii. Championships will be awarded based on points earned in specific classes [See Chart 2]
- iii. Walk-Trot Trail is open to both 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> year members but only counts toward the Championship for 2<sup>nd</sup> year.
- iv. Tie-breaker will be Horsemanship/Equitation.

### f. Driving Championships

- i. Two Championships will be awarded -
  - 1. Horse/Pony Driving Championship
  - 2. Small Equine Driving Championship
- ii. Championships will be based on points earned in specific classes [See Chart 2]
- iii. Tie-breaker will be Reinsmanship

### g. Specialty Championship

- Championships will be awarded based on points earned in specific classes [See Chart 2]
- ii. Ties will be broked based on the number of 1st place finishes.
  - 1. If that does not resolve the tie, number of 2<sup>nd</sup> place finishes, third place and so on until the tie is broken.
    - a. If Tie cannot be broken as stated above, in every case except for Champion multiple ribbons will be awarded.
    - b. In the case of an unbreakable tie for champion, the Superintendent and Judge will confer as how to best break said tie.

### h. Ranch Championships

- i. Two Championships will be awarded
  - 1. Jr Ranch Championship
  - 2. Sr Ranch Championship
- ii. Championships will be based on points earned in specific classes. [See Chart 2]
- iii. Tie-breaker will be Ranch Horsemanship.

### D. Versatility rules

- a. Exhibitors must have shown in a minimum of two (2) classes.
- b. Advisors must approve their club's exhibitors in this class.
- c. No Walk/Trot exhibitors are eligible to participate.
- d. Classes will be run in the following order:
  - i. English Equitation
  - ii. Western Horsemanship
  - iii. Reining
  - iv. Barreis
- e. All riders will be placed in each class (see § D(f)(ii) below).
- f. Disqualifications
  - Judge may disqualify any exhibitor in any class for inappropriate behavior, treatment of animal, and/or soundness
  - ii. Exhibitor's going off pattern, knocking over or on wrong side of cone, never performing specified gait, or overturning more than 1/4 turn than designated shall not be disqualified, but must always place below exhibitors not incurring a disqualifying fault.
    - 1. EXCEPTION Going off pattern in Barrels will result in either a 30 second penalty or a no-time (no Points) depending on the judge's decision.
      - a. All exhibitors going off pattern will be treated the same.
- g. Placings for all Classes and the Versatility Championship will be announced after the Barrels have been completed.
- h. Points are awarded to exhibitors based on their placings in each respective class.
  - Number of points will be based on the number of exhibitors who physically show in the English Equitation class regardless of the number of exhibitors in any other classes.
    - EX: 14 exhibitors show in class 1 English Equitation. A Due to a series of unfortunate events two exhibitors are unable to complete the remainder of the classes. Western Horsemanship, Reining and Barrels will still be placed as if there were 14 exhibitors so as not to outweigh one discipline over the others.
- i. Class Procedures:
  - i. Exhibitors are limited to no more than two (2) helpers to assist in tack changes.

1. Only 1 helper is allowed to be in the ring. The other must stay outside the fence.

### ii. Tack Changes

- 1. All tack and equipment changes must be completed in the arena in the five (5) minute window provided.
- 2. All Tack must be removed from the arena and/or fence within the five minutes.
  - a. Failure to follow these rules will result in a 2-point deduction from exhibitors total score for EACH infraction.
- After the tack change, and before the start of reining, exhibitors not
  actively showing will move to a designated "holding" area outside of the
  main arena that has been marked off and supervised for the safety of the
  exhibitors.
- 4. No one will be allowed to approach competitors and/or adjust equipment while they are in the "holding" area.
- Exhibitors MAY have water in said holding area, but it must be delivered by the holding area supervisor unless exhibitor was already in possession from the tack change.
- 6. After changing for barrels exhibitors may NOT practice around the barrels.

### j. Patterns:

- i. Equitation and Horsemanship will include a written pattern and at least one direction of rail work.
- ii. Reining will be either Pattern A or B
  - 1. Patterns will be announced and posted with Championship Patterns at 8PM on Wednesday of the fair.

### k. Tie-Breaker

- i. Tie breaker class will rotate based on the year, with rotation to start over in 2027
  - 1. 2024 English Equitation
  - 2. 2025 Reining
  - 3. 2026 Western Horsemanship
  - 4. 2027 Barrels

### I. CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY PROCEDURES

- Championship Trophies are awarded in accordance with the preceding rules on an annual rotation, and require exhibitor and parent to sign a Traveling Championship Trophies procedure document.
- ii. RETURN OF Traveling Championship Trophies must be returned to the Jr Fair Office no later than the third (3) weekend in August prior to the start of the Hancock County Fair.
  - Any exhibitor not returning a Traveling Championship Trophy prior to the start of the Jr Fair on Tuesday will be held financially responsible for a replacement.
- ili. Trophy Buckles All Traveling Championship Trophies will be accompanied by a sponsored Trophy Buckle, which will be the exhibitors to keep.
  - Exhibitors are required to complete separate thank-you requirements for receipt of trophy buckles.
  - 2. Starting in 2024 there will be no replacement trophies upon return of Traveling Championship Trophies, as the trophy buckles have been awarded in their place.

### E. Hancock County Horse Department Rules:

- a. Housing
  - Only horses and Ponies housed in the 4H Horse Barn will be permitted to participate in the Jr Fair Horse Show
    - 1. Exceptions may be made per the Director/Superintendent due to space requirements.
  - ii. Only one animal per stall
  - iii. Club Stall Assignments and policing the barn will be determined by the Hancock County Horse Council, with approval of the Department Director and Superintendent.
  - iv. Posted Stall Assignments are final
    - Any changes must be approved by Superintendent or Director
  - v. No Open Class horses/ponies will be assigned until after Jr Fair animals are housed.
  - vi. 4H and FFA Advisors should evaluate Exhibitor horses to ensure project is suitable to stall and meets body and condition requirements.
  - vii. Removal or combining stall panels must be approved by director prior to any action
  - viii. Any animals with a body condition score below Four (4) as determined by the Department Director and/or State licensed veterinarian will be removed from the grounds and prohibited from showing at the Hancock County Fair.
- b. Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) Exhibition Rules
  - i. Please see https://codes.ohio.gov/ohio-administrative-code/rule-901:1-18-08



### F. Barn/Grounds Rules:

- a. NO SMOKING IN/AROUND THE BARNS
- b. Extension cords must be in good working repair and OL rated for outdoor use with grounded 3 prong ends. No Household Fans.
- c. NO household/living room/soft-stuffed furniture may be used in any of the barns. Any questionable furniture must be approved by the Director.
- d. No heating appliances, cooking appliances, refrigerators or TV's may be used in the barn.
- e. No Tying/Cross-trying animals in the barn aisles
- f. No tying of unattended horses in stalls of wash rack
- g. If Exhibitor or exhibitor's animal makes a mess in wash rack, it is Exhibitors responsibility to clean up. SPECIFICALLY THE DRAIN MUST BE CLEARED AFTER EVERY USE.
- h. **NO PARKING IN BARN AREA.** Unload quickly and move cars, trucks, and trailers as quickly as possible to keep barns free from obstructions in case of emergencies.
- i. Each 4H Club will be allocated parking for a minimum of ONE (1) tack trailer which must be parked in designated areas assigned by Director/superintendent.
  - i. Additional trailers up to two (2) per club will be allowed if space provides.
- DO NOT BLOCK EXIT DOORS do not store supplies/feed in aisle ways of in front of exit doors.

- k. Arenas are not to be used as turn out areas. All horses must be on a lead rope or lungeline.
- I. Riding Areas: Riding is only permitted in the enclosed areas
  - i. No riding in the campground, midway area or race track. Please dismount when congested.
  - ii. No Double Riding
  - iii. No Riding in the Barns
  - iv. No animals may be ridden bareback with a halter/lead rope.

### G. General Class Rules

- a. Exhibitors must abide by the General Rules for Exhibits & Exhibitors as found in the Hancock County Fair Book (this publication), as well as the Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Shows as mentioned below.
- b. The Hancock County Jr Fair holds all exhibitors regardless of organization to the standards of behavior as outlined by the OSU Extension you can read them HERE: <a href="https://ohio4h.org/sites/ohio4h/files/imce/Code%20of%20Conduct%20%20as%20of%20">https://ohio4h.org/sites/ohio4h/files/imce/Code%20of%20Conduct%20%20as%20of%20</a> 2022 0.pdf
- c. Violation of any of these rules will result in the forfeit of cash premiums, and at the Fair Board's discretion those violating these policies may be banned from participating in further Jr Fair Horse & Pony activities for the current year and/or the following year.
- d. The Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Show is the core governing rules of the Hancock County Jr Fair Horse Show.
  - A Copy of this publication is available for non-4H exhibitors to look at in the Bell Tower
  - ii. Alternately, non-4H exhibitors may purchase a copy of the publication from the Hancock County OSU Extension office.
  - iii. In the event of a conflict between this fair publication and the Uniform Rules, the Hancock County Fair Book will take priority.
- e. Exhibitor Age Age will be determined as of January 1st of the current year.
  - i. Sr Exhibitor 14-18
  - ii. Jr Exhibitor 8-13
  - iii. Walk-Trot Limited to 1st and 2nd year members of any age.
- f. Unsafe Exhibitor Judge, Superintendent & Director all have the right and responsibility to remove from the show any animal exhibiting unsafe or threatening behavior, unsound, or an exhibitor/parent/trainer/advisor showing/demonstrating unsportsmanlike conduct.
  - i. Decisions are final and undisputable.
  - ii. Unsportsmanlike conduct towards judges, show management, fair directors, exhibitors, or physical abuse of the project horse will not be tolerated.
  - iii. Violators will be dismissed from the show and/or subject to further actions.
- g. Judge Questions Speaking to the judge's prerogative, however this must be done through the Ring Steward or Superintendent after the class.
  - Parents may not enter the arena to question the judge; requests must go through the Ring Steward or Superintendents after the class.
- h. Declared projects Only project animals declared as of January 1st of the current year will be allowed to exhibit during the Jr Fair Horse Show.

- Lease agreements and ID cards for project animals must have been submitted to the Hancock OSU Extension office or appropriate FFA advisor (for non-4H members) by June 1 of the current year.
  - 1. All horses and ponies housed must be shown.
- i. Multiple Horses Any Exhibitor beyond their second year of showing may take up to two (2) general light horse projects per year, provided those animals are registered appropriately through their appropriate organization. (IE 4H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc). This rule is reviewed biannually with the current cycle ending in 2025
- j. Shared Horse On a rolling two (2) year trial basis beginning in 2024 and being reviewed by the Jr Fair Superintendent and Director at the conclusion of the 2025 Hancock County Fair; Two (2) Exhibitors from the same family may share a horse/riding pony if all the following conditions are met:
  - Conditions:
    - One (1) Exhibitor is showing in Walk/Trot and One (1) Exhibitor is showing in an Age Group. (ex 8-13 or 14-18);
    - Both Exhibitors are members of the same family.;
      - a. For the purpose of this trial the term "family" is defined as full siblings, half siblings, or step siblings that reside in the same family domicile at least 50% of the year.
        - In the event of unusual family circumstances, please speak to Jr Fair Horse Department Superintendent or Director for approval.
    - 3. Copies of both exhibitors Horse ID cards are provided to the Jr Fair Office no later than the close of Jr Fair entries.
  - ii. Shared Horse Restrictions:
    - 1. Shared horses are subject to a maximum class per day limit of seven (7), to ensure the health and welfare of animals in the public eye.
    - 2. Shared horses are still subject to the thirty (30) day restriction prior to move in of the Hancock County Fair. [Please see §(G)(r) infra]
    - 3. Exhibitors cannot share more than one (1) animal.
- Entries Exhibitors must show in classes as entered with the Jr Fair Coordinator via the online entry system.
  - Advisors are strongly recommended to review 4H members entries prior to submission.
    - 1. If an Exhibitor enters a class which their Advisor feels they are not safely able to complete, said Advisor may force exhibitor to scratch.
      - a. Exhibitor may appeal this scratch to the Superintended by filling out an appeal form (available at Bell Tower for from the Superintendent) a minimum of 24 hours prior to said class.
        - Appeal will be reviewed by Department Director and Superintendent.
- Cross-Discipline rules Exhibitors may only show each horse in one (1) English
  discipline, and one (1) Western discipline per show, and horse must remain in that
  division category for the duration. [See D(b)]
  - For the Hancock County Jr Fair Horse Show, the duration of the show show is defined as the entirety of the Jr Fair Division beginning on Tuesday and ending after the Versatility on Thursday.
  - ii. English Disciplines are either Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat.

- iii. Western Divisions are either Western or Ranch
  - 1. EXCEPTIONS
    - a. Lack of Commiserate Class The only time an exhibitor who has chosen to show Ranch may cross over into "regular" Western is if there is not a commiserate Ranch Class offered.
      - i. 2024 Hancock County Jr Fair Trail, Trail-in-Hand, Reining.
    - b. Versatility Exhibitors may present as either Hunt Seat/Saddle Seat or Western/Ranch in the applicable portion of the class, but the presentation must be the same as any classes that horse exhibited earlier in the show.
    - c. Dressage Exhibitors may show dressage regardless of whether they have shown Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat prior in the show.
    - d. Walk-Trot Exhibitors may present as either Hunt Seat/Saddle Seat or Western/Ranch but must be shown the same across all classes as the show, including Walk/Trot Trail or Trail in Hand.
- m. Gaited Animals May show either Gaited or Age Group, but must maintain that classification for the duration of the show.
  - i. Show is defined as the first day of the Jr Fair Horse Show (Tuesday) through the last day of the Jr Fair Horse Show (Thursday).
  - ii. Gaited animals are NOT Required to show in Gaited Classes, but if showing in a regular three-gaited class they must perform walk trot(jog) and canter(lope).
  - iii. Prohibited Classes:
    - Any class which requires a canter or lope as a core basis of the class judging including but not limited to Reining, Western Riding, and any Dressage Class.
  - iv. Exception Classes:
    - 1. Contesting (no penalty for Galloping)
- n. Ponies May show either Pony or Age Group, but must maintain that classification for the duration of the show.
  - i. Show is defined as the first day of the Jr Fair Horse Show (Tuesday) through the last day of the Jr Fair Horse Show (Thursday).
  - ii. Ponies may show in any classes that are not restricted by Age Group including but not limited to:
    - 1. Contesting
    - Reining
    - 3. Western Riding
    - 4. Dressage
- Back Numbers are provided on a bi-annual basis via the Hancock OSU Extension
  office to all 4H members for PAS Qualifying and Summer shows. 4H Exhibitors will use
  those numbers for each animal as they were assigned.
- p. Non-4H Exhibitors will use the number provided to them by the Jr Fair for their 1st horse.
  - If the Exhibitor is taking more than one horse, please contact the Superintendent as soon as possible to receive a second number and to identify which number will be used for what animal.
- q. Interviews All Jr Fair Livestock exhibitors must complete a project interview for their organization.
  - Exhibitors who fail to complete interviews by the date specified by their organization will not be allowed to compete at the fair.

- r. Working/Riding Restrictions No riding or training of a Jr Fair Light Horse Project by anyone other than the Jr Fair Exhibitor will be permitted within thirty (30) days of the first day of the Hancock County Fair. (Tuesday).
  - i. Restrictions will be in place through the conclusion of Thursdays classes, or the last Jr Fair class the exhibitor is registered for, whichever occurs first.
  - ii. Parents, Advisors, Adults or other Jr Fair Exhibitors may assist the exhibitor with challenging tasks including but not limited to lunging, saddling, and clipping their animal, but the exhibitor must be actively involved in the process.
    - 1. This rule is not so strict as to preclude the inevitability of things like bathroom breaks, running to retrieve forgotten equipment, or protection of the showmanship shirt from face glow. However, youth must be present, or in the alternative absent for only a short period of time while an adult is holding the animal.
  - iii. An adult may accompany or head for driving exhibitors to maintain safety.
    - 1. NO ONE OTHER THAN THE EXHIBITOR MAY DRIVE THE ANIMAL.
- s. Dead or Disabled Horse Rule A certificate of Death or disability must be provided to the Jr Fair Coordinator, Department Director, or Superintendent from a licensed area veterinarian who is approved by the Ohio ODA by 9AM on Wednesday morning of the Hancock County Fair.
  - i. A lease of the replacement horse must be provided in writing to the Jr Fair Coordinator, Department Director, or Superintendent ASAP.
    - Additional reporting requirements may be required through your FFA or 4H Organization – responsibility of complying with those organizations falls to the exhibitor.
  - ii. Dead Horse If leased horse is replacing a dead horse, Exhibitor can show for placing AKA as if it was the original horse.
  - iii. Disabled Horse If leased horse is replacing a disabled horse, Exhibitor can show for grade only.
- t. Stallions A stallion can ONLY be shown in a Jr Fair if they are a weanling IE under 1 year of age.

### u. Trophies

- i. Sponsored Trophies will be awarded in all classes based on judge's discretion.
  - 1. If standards for the classes are NOT met disqualification may result.
  - 2. Exhibitors must complete thank-you's for the sponsors to the Office staff satisfaction prior to receiving their trophy.

### v. Disqualifications

- Judge may disqualify any exhibitor in any class for inappropriate behavior, treatment of animal, and/or soundness
- ii. Gaited Animals failing to perform required gaits in non-gaited classes.
- iii. For Walk-trot Horsemanship/Equitation, Walk-Trot Trail, and Versatility ONLY:
  - Exhibitor's going off pattern, knocking over or on wrong side of cone, never performing specified gait, or overturning more than 1/4 turn than designated shall not be disqualified, but must always place below exhibitors not incurring a disqualifying fault.

### w. Class Specific Rules

i. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as they wish. Classes will not be held more than 2 minutes for tack changes.

- Exception Shared Horses are limited to a total of seven (7) total classes per day. [Please see § (G)(j)(ii)]
- ii. Showmanship Showmanship is MANDATORY for 1st year exhibitors.
  - Western Dress Code:
    - a. Plain black/Blue Jeans (no bling or embellishments)
    - b. Plain Button up Oxford Shirt of any color (no trim, no embroidery).
    - c. Western Hat/Helmet
    - d. Belts & Scarves are permissible and can include "bling"
  - 2. English Dress Code:
    - a. Hunt Seat or Saddle Seat Attire.
- iii. Contesting Must wear collared shirt, jeans, boots with 1" heel and helmet.
  - 1. 5 second penalty for knocked obstacles
  - 2. No Time if off pattern.
  - 3. Additional rules regarding bits, tie downs, whips/over-unders and other equipment can be found in **The Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Show [See § (E)(d) above for information]**.
- iv. Trail/Trail-in-Hand
  - 1. No exhibitor may show the same horse in both Trail and Trail in Hand.
- v. Dressage/Western Dressage
  - Exhibitors wanting to participate in Dressage/Western Dressage will
    provide their own LEGIBLE test to the Superintendent in the Bell Tower no
    later than 8am on Wednesday of the fair in order to allow the judge to
    prepare for the class.
    - a. Failing to meet these obligations will result in the exhibitor being disqualified.
- vi. Cross-Discipline rules Exhibitors may only show each horse in one (1) English discipline, and one (1) Western discipline per show, and horse must remain in that division category for the duration. [Please See § D(b) above for complete rule]

#### H. Helmet Policy

- a. All Youth 19 years and under, participating in any Jr Fair equestrian activity, are required to wear a properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding/driving.
  - i. Helmets are recommending but not required for in-hand classes.
- b. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent/guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use and is properly fitted/in good condition. The Ohio 4H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel, Volunteer leaders and Hancock County Fair Board directors are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance.
- c. The Ohio 4H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel, Volunteer leaders and Hancock County Fair Board directors make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and cautions riders that

- death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.
- d. The Ohio 4H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel, Volunteer leaders and Hancock County Fair board directors may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved, defective, or improperly fitted headgear, he/she will not be permitted to participate in riding/driving activities until proper headgear is acquired.

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# Jr Fair Draft Horse Department Rules 2024

#### General Rules

- A. Exhibitors must abide by the General Rules for Exhibits & Exhibitors as found in the Hancock County Fair Book (this publication), as well as the Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Shows as mentioned below.
  - a. STANDARDS OF BEHAVIOR INSERT HERE
  - b. Violation of any of these rules will result in the forfeit of cash premiums, and at the Fair Board's discretion those violating these policies may be banned from participating in further Jr Fair Horse & Pony activities for the current year or the following year.
  - c. The Uniform Rules for 4H Horse Show is the core governing rules of the Hancock County Jr Fair Horse Show.
    - A Copy of this publication is available for non-4H exhibitor to look at in the Bell Tower
    - ii. Alternately, non-4H exhibitors may purchase a copy of the publication from the Hancock County OSU Extension office.
    - iii. In the event of a conflict between this fair publication and the Uniform Rules, the Hancock County Fair Book will take priority.
  - d. Exhibitor Age Age will be determined as of January 1st of the current year.
    - i. Sr Exhibitor 14-18
    - ii. Jr Exhibitor 8-13
    - iii. Novice Limited to 1st and 2nd year members of any age.
- B. Only Draft Horses housed at the Fair will be permitted to show at the Jr Fair Draft Horse Show
- C. Exhibitors Age will be determined as of January 1st of the current year.
- D. Showmanship
  - a. Showmanship is mandatory for 1st and 2nd year participants.
  - b. Showmanship is limited to one (1) showmanship class
  - c. Dress Code:
    - i. Khaki or Black Pants
    - ii. Polo Shirts
      - Embroidery allowed on L Chest of Polo Shirts.
- E. Draft Animals may not show in both the Jr Fair Draft Horse & Jr Fair Light Horse departments a. EXCEPTION – Dressage.
- F. Working/Riding Restrictions No riding or training of a Jr Fair Draft Horse Project by anyone other than the Jr Fair Exhibitor will be permitted upon moving into the Fairgrounds on Tuesday of Fair Week.
  - a. Restrictions will be in place through the conclusion of Thursdays classes, or the last class the exhibitor is registered for, whichever occurs first.
  - b. Parents, Advisors, Adults or other Jr Fair Exhibitors may assist the exhibitor with challenging tasks including but not limited to grooming, saddling, and harnessing their animal, but the exhibitor must be actively involved in the process.
    - This rule is not so strict as to preclude the inevitability of things like bathroom breaks, running to retrieve forgotten equipment, or protection of the showmanship shirt from grime. However youth must be present, or in the

- alternative absent for only a short period of time while an adult is holding the animal.
- ii. EXCEPTION Jr Fair Draft Horses may be used for other special activities including but not limited to Draft Shows and parades.
- c. Jr Fair Draft animals are exempt from the thirty (30) day work and training rule applied to the Jr Fair Light Horse Department [See Section G(I) in the Jr Fair Light Horse Department] due to the opportunities and obligations for farms and hitches to provide services to the communities and to their owners.
  - i. Jr Fair Exhibitors are still expected to be an active part of the handling/showing of their animal as much as possible during the course of their lease period.
  - ii. EXCEPTION if a Jr Fair Draft horse is showing OUTSIDE of the Jr Fair Draft Horse department, they will be expected to adhere to the rules and limitations of the department in which they are showing.
    - 1. EX: Jr Fair Exhibitor has a Draft Horse which they have decided to show in Barrel Racing or Dressage. Due to their participation in the Jr Fair Light Horse Department Show, these exhibitors are subject to all rules of the Jr Fair Light Horse Department; including but not limited to the thirty (30) day restriction on who may show, train, and handle project animal. [See Jr Fair Light Horse Rules included in this Fair Book, specifically Section G(I)]
- d. Multiple Horses Any Exhibitor beyond their second year of showing may take up to two (2) general horse projects per year, provided those animals are registered appropriately through their appropriate organization. (IE 4H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc). This rule is reviewed biannually with the current cycle ending in 2025
- e. Shared Horse On a rolling two (2) year trial basis beginning in 2024 and being reviewed by the Jr Fair Superintendent and Director at the conclusion of the 2025 Hancock County Fair; Two (2) Exhibitors from the same family may share a horse/riding pony if all the following conditions are met:
  - i. Conditions:
    - 1. One (1) Exhibitor is showing in Walk/Trot and One (1) Exhibitor is showing in an Age Group. (ex 8-13 or 14-18);
    - 2. Both Exhibitors are members of the same family.;
      - a. For the purpose of this trial the term "family" is defined as full siblings, half siblings, or step siblings that reside in the same family domicile at least 50% of the year.
        - In the event of unusual family circumstances, please speak to Jr Fair Horse Department Superintendent or Director for approval.
    - 3. Copies of both exhibitors Horse ID cards are provided to the Jr Fair Office no later than the close of Jr Fair entries.
  - ii. Shared Horse Restrictions:
    - 1. Shared horses are subject to a maximum class per day limit of seven (7), to ensure the health and welfare of animals in the public eye.
    - 2. Shared horses are still subject to the thirty (30) day restriction prior to move in of the Hancock County Fair. [Please see §(G)(r) infra]
    - 3. Exhibitors cannot share more than one (1) animal.

- a. Winner of the Sr Draft Showmanship will be the representative from the Draft Horse department for Showman of Showmen.
  - i. The same exhibitor can NOT represent the department two years in a row.
    - 1. EXCEPTION If the Reserve Champion is unable or unwilling to be the Draft Horse Department Representative.
      - a. Only then can the same exhibitor represent the Draft Horse Department 2 years in a row.
  - ii. An exhibitor CAN represent the Draft Horse Department more than once, just not two years in a row (excepting the situation in F(a)(i)(1).
- b. Sr Draft Showmanship Champion must turn in the Showman of Showman exhibitor packet to the Superintendent no later than 8 pm Thursday of fair week.
- c. Showman of Showmen representative must make their animal available for use in the Showman of Showmen contest.

## H. Draft Decorating Contest -

- a. Draft Decorating preparation portion will be held in the Jr Fair Draft Barn.
- b. The time restrictions for each age group will be as follows:

- c. Exhibitors will then move to the North Grandstand for placement and their Showmanship Classes.
- I. Grand Champion Draft Horse Exhibitor
  - a. Grand Champion Draft Horse is a points-based championship.

      - 1. First place will be awarded points equal to the number of exhibitors that competed in the class, not to exceed 6 points.

        as an exhibitor when determining points earned by the exhibitors who
        place in the class.

        - a. If one of those exhibitors has a no-time or is otherwise disqualified, the winner of the class would still receive 6 points.
        - b. If only 5 exhibitors entered the arena to show, the maximum number of points awarded to 1<sup>st</sup> place would be reduced to 5 points.
    - ii. All Draft exhibitors are included in points calculation regardless of age
      - 1. Championship will place from Grand and Reserve down to 6th place.
      - 2. Tie Breaker whoever received the greater number of 1st places
        - a. Any ties that cannot be broken by this method other than champion will both receive their ribbons.
          - Championship ties that cannot be broken will be deferred to the Judge and Superintendent.

#### RULES

Per Health Regulations from the State of Ohio Department of Agriculture – Each poultry exhibitor must comply with one of the following:

901:1-18-05 Poultry and Fowl

See: https://codes.ohio.gov/ohio-administrative-code/rule-901:1-18-05

- (A) All TURKEYS, CHICKENS and GAMEBIRDS moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must either:
- (1) Originate directly from a FLOCK or HATCHERY which is a participant in the NATIONAL POULTRY IMPROVEMENT PLAN (NPIP) for the eradication of disease and

be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;

- (2) Originate directly from a FLOCK which has had a NEGATIVE TEST for PULLORUM/FOWL TYPHOID DISEASE within TWELVE MONTHS PRECEDING THE OPENING DATE OF EXHIBITION and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph;
- (3) Have had a NEGATIVE TEST FOR PULLORUM/FOWL TYPHOID DISEASE, WITHIN NINETY DAYS, PRECEDING THE OPENING DATE OF THE EXHIBITION and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- (B) The RAPID WHOLE BLOOD TEST SHALL NOT BE USED TO TEST TURKEYS for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) WATERFOWL, DOVES and PIGEONS are exempt from this rule.

#### All Classes

#### General

- 1. Exhibitors must abide by all Junior Fair Rules and Regulations.
- 2. All Birds and/or eggs must be selected from birds in exhibitor's project

#### PRIOR TO FAIR

- 1. Exhibitors are <u>REQUIRED</u> to submit a properly *completed Hancock County Junior Fair Poultry Guideline Form* for the current year to the Poultry Superintendent by **July 31st**. Violation of this rule prohibits the exhibitor from exhibiting poultry projects at the fair unless a late submission has been approved by the Poultry Superintendent.
- 2. Per the Ohio Department of Agriculture, a valid health certificate is **REQUIRED** for each chicken, turkey, and guinea to be exhibited. See Rule 901:1-18-05 above.
- 3. If the bird is less than 1 year old, the hatchery invoice with the NPIP participant stamp/information serves as the health certificate.
- 4. If a chicken or guinea is greater than 1 year old, each bird must be Pullorum tested by a certified Pullorum tester within 90 days before the first day of the fair. Contact the **Blanchard Valley Poultry Association** or a Poultry Superintendent for scheduled Pullorum testing events or Pullorum tester contact information.

- 5. If a turkey is greater than 1 year old, each turkey must be NPIP tested by a certified NPIP tester within a year of the first day of the fair. Contact the Blanchard Valley Poultry Association or a Poultry Superintendent for NPIP tester information.
- 6. Health certificates for each poultry project are <u>REOUIRED</u> to be submitted online to the Poultry Superintendent by July 31st. Paper copies of health certificates will NOT be accepted. Violation of this rule prohibits the exhibitor from exhibiting poultry projects at the fair unless a late submission has been approved by the Poultry Superintendent.
- 7. Submitted health certificates are <u>REQUIRED</u> to display purchase location, purchase date and NPIP participant stamp/information.

# FAIR CHECK-IN/WEIGH-IN

- 1. All birds are **REQUIRED** to enter the fairgrounds through the McCleary Gate and be subject to veterinarian inspection.
- 2. For fancy birds, the poultry barn will be open for check-in on Monday prior to the fair from 9:00 AM until 8:00 PM.
- 3. For market birds, the birds will be banded and weighed on Monday prior to the fair from 12:00 NOON until 6:00 PM. Market birds cannot check into the poultry barn without a completed weigh slip.
- 4. All entries must be in place before 8:00 PM on Monday before the fair. If poultry exhibits arrive after 8:00 PM, the birds must be removed from the fairgrounds unless prior Poultry Superintendent approval has been received.
- 5. All exhibitors must check-in before entering the barn with their birds and/or eggs. Violation of this rule will result in the exhibitor removing all poultry exhibits from the fairgrounds.
- 6. Market animals are **REQUIRED** to be weighed with exhibitor present. If an exhibitor **CANNOT** be present for weigh-in of their animals, the Poultry Superintendent must be notified prior to weigh-in day. If this rule is violated, the Poultry Superintendent and Poultry Director in charge have the final decision on whether the exhibitor's birds can be weighed and exhibited.
- 7. Birds are **REQUIRED** to have dry feathers and body for check-in and weigh-in. Violation of this rule will prohibit the exhibitor from checking-in and/or weighing wet birds for exhibition.
- 8. No sorting, swapping or substitution of birds will be allowed once checked-in at the Fair.

  Once a bird is checked-in, the bird CANNOT be replaced with a different bird. EXCEPTION 
  If a market bird expires or is damaged after weigh-in, the exhibitor must obtain approval from

the Poultry Superintendent and Poultry Director in charge to weigh a replacement bird PRIOR to the end of the posted weigh-in time.

# FAIR MARKET-BREED SHOW/SHOWMANSHIP/LIVESTOCK SALE RING

- 1. Exhibitor is **REQUIRED** to dress in black/dark blue jeans, long-sleeved white shirt or lab coat and closed toe boots or shoes covering the foot to the ankle to participate in the Market/Breed Show, Showmanship, or Livestock Sale. Exhibitor is **PROHIBITED** from participating in the Market/Breed Show, Showmanship or Livestock Sale if not dressed in proper show attire. Replacement Junior Fair exhibitors are **REQUIRED** to follow the proper show attire.
- 2. Exhibitor MUST BE PRESENT at time of show. No premiums will be awarded if exhibitor does not participate in the show. If exhibitor cannot be present at time of judging, the exhibitor is **REQUIRED** to complete a Junior Fair Poultry Show Replacement Form for each class and personally submit the form to a Poultry Superintendent prior to 11 AM on the first day of the fair. The exhibitor must state on the form who is permitted to show and move their bird(s). An exhibitor forfeits the right to have their bird(s) compete in a class upon failure to complete or properly submit the Junior Fair Poultry Show Replacement Form. The final decision is at the discretion of the Poultry Superintendent and Poultry Director in charge, See Hancock County Junior Fair Rules and Regulations.
- 3. Birds are **REQUIRED** to have dry feathers and body for market/breed show, showmanship, or sale in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitors forfeit the ability to exhibit or sell their animals with wet feathers and/or bodies.

## FAIR RESIDENCY

- 1. Exhibitor is **REQUIRED** to provide their own food, bedding, and dishes.
- 2. All exhibitors are required to provide proper care. This includes cleaning their own exhibits and providing fresh bedding twice a day, providing fresh food at least once a day, providing fresh water as needed throughout the day. Each pen will have a care card and exhibits will be inspected at 9 AM and 9 PM daily. If an issue is discovered, a date and time stamped sticker will be placed on the care card. The exhibitor must resolve the issue and notify the Poultry Superintendent within 24 hours. If an exhibitor fails to provide proper care in a timely manner:

FIRST OFFENSE: The exhibitor will receive a written warning.

**SECOND OFFENSE:** The exhibitor will be required to meet with the Poultry director in charge and Poultry Superintendent.

THIRD OFFENSE OR FAILURE TO MEET WITH BARN OFFICIALS: The Poultry Director and Poultry Superintendent have the right to withhold premiums, remove exhibitor from the Livestock Sale or impose participation limitations in next year's fair.

- Securing cage doors with a locking device is prohibited. Poultry Superintendent and/or Poultry
  Director in charge reserve the right to cut locking devices from cages. Zip-ties are recommended
  to secure cage doors.
- 4. Personal supplies are <u>REQUIRED</u> to be stored in barn/tent beneath cage supports or within personal vehicle. Supplies cannot be in aisleways (fully or partially), next to cages or outside of barn/tent.

#### FAIR RELEASE

- 1. Birds CANNOT be removed prior to release date and dismissal time without approval of the Poultry Superintendent, Poultry Director in charge, and Veterinarian. Contact the Poultry Superintendent or Poultry Director in charge to obtain approval and the proper release form.
- Eggs CANNOT be removed from the barn once checked in. They ARE NOT a take-home project and will be disposed of by either the Poultry Director in charge or a Poultry Superintendent.
- 3. Exhibitor is responsible for cleaning pen and surrounding area once birds are released.

#### ALL MARKET BIRDS - MEAT CHICKENS, MEAT TURKEY, MEAT DUCKS, MEAT GEESE

- 1. Weigh-in will be held Monday prior to the fair and market animals must be weighed during the posted weigh-in time. NO EXCEPTIONS!
- Market animals <u>not</u> weighed during the posted weigh-in time CANNOT be sold in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. If non-weighed market birds are caged/penned, they will receive an alternate ID band and will go base bid.
- 3. A Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) form is required for each turkey or pen of meat chickens/meat ducks/meat geese. **No form- No banding no weigh-in.**
- Birds with wet feathers and/or bodies will not be banded, weighed, exhibited or sold.

- 5. Market birds will be banded prior to weigh-in. If a bird is not banded, it <u>will not</u> be weighed, <u>will not exhibit</u> and must leave the fairgrounds.
- 6. Weigh slips must be filled out completely or market animal will go base bid.
- 7. Market animals must be weighed with exhibitor present before being penned. If an exhibitor **CANNOT** be present for weigh-in of their animals, the Poultry Superintendent must be notified prior to weigh-in day.
- 8. Market animals will only be weighed once.
- 9. All market animals weighed will be caged for an exhibit and cannot go home.
- 10. No sorting, swapping or substitution of birds will be allowed once checked-in at the fair. Once a bird is checked-in, the bird CANNOT be replaced with a different bird. EXCEPTION If a market bird expires or is damaged after weigh-in, the exhibitor must obtain approval from the Poultry Superintendent and Poultry Director in charge to weigh replacement bird PRIOR to the end of the posted weigh-in time.
- 11. This is a terminal sale for all species of market birds. All market birds will be sold to the base bidder. There are no take home projects.
- 12. Exhibitor can sell only one (1) market class entry through sale ring. Exception Champion and Reserve Champion. See Junior Fair Livestock Sale Sale Ring, Market Bid, Take Home.
- 13. Each exhibitor is **REQUIRED** to provide their own pen/cage to sell their market birds in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

#### MEAT CHICKENS

- 1. Meat Chickens must be hatched and in exhibitor's possession five (5) to seven (7) weeks prior to the first day of the fair of the current year.
- 2. Exhibitor allowed one (1) entry in class.
- 3. A pen of meat chickens contains three (3) commercial chickens of same breed, variety, age and sex. The birds can be de-beaked, de-toed, dubbed or subjected to any practice generally accepted in the commercial production of meat type poultry.
- 4. Pens will be placed in a weight class for judging. The weight class is determined by the combined weight of all three (3) meat chickens:
  - Fryer minimum of 10 pounds and a maximum less than 13 pounds and 8 ounces.

Broiler - Minimum of 13 pounds and 8 ounces and a maximum of 21 Pounds.

Overweight - Over 21 pounds.

- 5. Pens weighing less than 10 pounds will not be caged, will not exhibit, and must leave the fairgrounds.
- 6. Pens must be judged in the Broiler weight class to be eligible for banners and to be sold in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.
- 7. Refer to All Market Birds Meat Chickens, Meat Turkey, Meat Ducks, Meat Geese section for additional guidelines.
- 8. Banners: Grand Champion Meat Chickens and Reserve Champion Meat Chickens

#### **MEAT TURKEYS**

- 1. Meat Turkeys must be hatched no earlier than April 15th of current year.
- 2. Meat Turkeys must be in exhibitor's possession no later than June 1st of current year.
- 3. Exhibitor allowed one (1) entry in class.
- 4. Meat Turkeys are REQUIRED to be a hen.
- 5. Meat Turkeys will be placed in a weight class for judging. The weight classes are:
  - Fryer Minimum 14 pounds and a maximum of less than 18 pounds
  - Young Turkey Minimum of 18 pounds and a maximum of 30 pounds.
  - Overweight Over 30 pounds.
- 6. Pens weighing less than 14 pounds will not be caged, will not exhibit, and must leave the fairgrounds.
- 7. Meat Turkeys must be in the Young Turkey weight class to be eligible for banners.
- 8. Meat Turkeys must be in the Young Turkey weight class to be sold in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.
- 9. Refer to All Market Birds Meat Chickens, Meat Turkey, Meat Ducks, Meat Geese section for additional guidelines.
- 10. Banners: Grand Champion Meat Turkey and Reserve Champion Meat Turkey.

#### MEAT DUCKS/GEESE

- Meat Ducks/Geese must be hatched no earlier than October 1st of previous year.
- 2. Meat Ducks must be in exhibitor's possession seven (7) weeks prior to the first day of the fair of the current year.
- 3. Meat Geese must be in exhibitor's possession sixteen (16) weeks prior to the first day of the fair of the current year.
- 4. Exhibitor allowed one (1) entry in Meat Duck class and one (1) entry in Meat Geese class.
- 5. A pen of meat ducks/geese contains two (2) birds of same breed, variety and sex. Both Meat Ducks/Geese should be similar in age.
- 6. Meat Duck breed is **REQUIRED** to be Rouen or Pekin.
- 7. Refer to All Market Birds Meat Chickens, Meat Turkey, Meat Ducks, Meat Geese section for additional guidelines.
- 8. Grand Champion Meat waterfowl & reserve Champion Meat Waterfowl selected from combined Meat Duck and Meat Geese classes.
- 9. Banners: Grand Champion Meat Waterfowl and Reserve Champion Meat Waterfowl.

#### MARKET EGGS

- Limited to exhibitors in either the Hybrid Production Hen or Hybrid Production
   Pullet class.
- 2. Exhibitor allowed one (1) entry in class.
- 3. Must provide thirteen (13) eggs produced by hens/pullets entered in the **Hybrid Production Hen or Hybrid Production Pullet class**.
- 4. NO store-bought eggs permitted.
- Eggs will be judged on uniformity, size, shape, color, sheen and freshness, and shell texture.
- 6. One (1) egg will be broken to judge interior quality.

- 7. Poultry Director in charge or Poultry Superintendents will dispose of Market Eggs. They ARE NOT a take home project, ARE NOT sold in sale ring or go base bid.
- 8. Monetary Award: Best of Show Market Eggs.

#### **EANCY TURKEYS**

Per Heath Regulations from the State of Ohio Department of Agriculture - Rule 901:1-18-05, the RAPID WHOLE BLOOD TEST SHALL NOT BE USED TO TEST TURKEYS. Please review the entire text of Rule 901:1-15-05 for health certificate and/or testing guidelines.

1. Refer to All Other Poultry section for additional guidelines.

## Hybrid Production Hen/Pullet

- 1. Pen requires two (2) female birds of same breed, variety and similar in age.
- 2. Birds must be in production.
- 3. Birds entered in the Hybrid Production Hen or Hybrid Production Pullet class cannot be entered in additional classes (Hen, Pullet or Trio).
- 4. Bird breed must be hybrid or crossbred. Breed CANNOT be listed as an American Poultry Association Accepted Breed (https://amerpoultryassn.com/accepted-breeds-varieties/).
- 5. Refer to All Other Poultry section for additional guidelines.
- 6. Banners: Multiple
- 7. Monetary Award: Best of Show Production,

#### **ALL OTHER POULTRY**

- 1. All birds must be in exhibitor's possession no later than June 1st of current year.
- Exhibitor allowed one (1) entry in each class.
- 3. Age definition:
  - Cock Male hatched prior to September 1 of previous year
  - Cockerel Male hatched after September 1 of previous year
  - · Hen Female hatched prior to September 1 of previous year
  - Pullet Female hatched after September 1 of previous year

- 4. The following classes require two (2) female birds of same breed, variety and similar in age. Trio class requires male bird to be same breed and variety as females.

#### JUNIOR FAIR SHOWMANSHIP RULES

- 1. Exhibitors are permitted to participate in the showmanship class for any species the exhibitor showed in the Junior Fair Market/Breed judging contest of the current year.
- Exhibitors are <u>REQUIRED</u> to dress in black/dark blue jeans, long-sleeved white shirt or lab coat and closed toe boots or shoes covering the foot to the ankle to participate.
- 3. Exhibitors are required to show their own bird(s). No borrowing or swapping of birds.

- 4. Only exhibitors present during showmanship class judging are eligible for award placement.
- 5. Super Showmanship includes current and previous showmanship winners for all poultry species (chicken, waterfowl, turkey) of any age specification.
- 6. Showmanship class winners cannot compete in the same class the following year but may compete in the next higher age division or Super Showmanship. An exhibitor may resume competition upon completion of one (1) year absent period.
- 7. The exhibitor who receives first place in any senior showmanship class will sit out the following year as well as the Showman of Showmen representative if they were not the first-place winner. Exhibitors may resume competition upon completion of one (1) year absent period.
- 8. Winners of the following showmanship classes compete in the Small Animal Showman of Showmen contest:
  - a. Chicken Showmanship Senior
  - b. Waterfowl Showmanship Senior
  - c. Turkey Showmanship Senior
- 9. If an exhibitor is a previous winner of the Small Animal Showman of Showmen, they cannot participate in the contest a second time and participation will be given to the second-place winner of their respective class.
- 10. Awards: All Junior Fair Showmanship Classes.

- Weights will be minimum of 3.5 lbs. and maximum of 5.5 lbs. each rabbit. All rabbits must make this weight at weigh in at the fair.
- These three rabbits may not be shown in any other class.
- The four factors in order of their importance for judging meat pens are: 1) Meat Type,
   2) condition, 3) uniformity, 4) fur.
- Meat pens shall be all the same breed and variety

# 02 Independent Meat Pen of Three (3)

- Age Limit is 10-12 weeks old depending on your breed.
- Three (3) rabbits must be in exhibitor's possession by August 1 of present year and remain in their possession until shown at the Hancock Co Fair
- The exhibitor must have another project rabbit in their possession on or before June
   1 to show in this class
- These three rabbits may not be shown in any other class.
- The four factors in order of their importance for judging meat pens are: 1) Meat Type,
   2) condition, 3) uniformity, 4) fur.
- Market pens shall be all the same breed and variety.

# All Market pens must be sold at auction unless noted to go to base bid.

#### **BREED SHOW CLASSES**

## 01 Trio of Rabbits

These Rabbits must be of breeding age. One buck and two does. This trio will be all the same breed and showing the best qualities of that breed. You will demonstrate how correcting the best traits will improve your flock.

#### 02 Single Fryer

Rabbit can be any sex, 10 – 12 weeks old depending on breed, commercial breed for meat only. Minimum 3.5 lbs. and maximum 5.5 lbs Cannot be part of any meat pen. And will not be sold at the auction. This ideally could be returned to your stock and used for breeding next year.

# SINGLE RABBITS- Senior Buck, Senior Doe, Junior Buck, Junior Doe

- 4. Each exhibitor will be allowed to enter a maximum of eight (8) classes. Having at least one Rabbit by June 1. No substitutions will be allowed after official entry is submitted.
  - a. Anly one (1) entry will be allowed by Exhibitor in #01 Born & Raised Meat Pen of Three or #02 Meat Pen of Three Independent.
- b. When entering a Born & Raised Pen of Three the Breed Doe must be entered and come to the fair as a single rabbit. This rabbit will be registered with the

- 5. All rabbits must be tattooed prior to bringing them to the fair. A date will be offered to tattoo all rabbits coming to the fair at a date to be announced around the first of August.
- a. All meat pen rabbits must be tattooed on the date offered in August. This will be at 6:00 pm at the Fairgrounds. The exhibitor does not need to be present. The tattoo numbers will be recorded and verified at check in for the fair during check in and weigh in.
  - b. You may tattoo up to 6 rabbits for meat pens coming to the fair. You will choose 3 at check in to be your meat pen and 1 for fryer. The others may be shown as single junior rabbits.
- 6. All Rabbits must be free of any visible signs of disease and have no open sores to remain on the grounds.
- 7. Drug Use Notification Forms are now automated, and information will need to be provided at weigh in on Monday prior to fair.
- 8. All cages must be cleaned before 10:00 a.m. or after 9:00 p.m.
- 9. All Junior Fair Exhibitors must be responsible for care, feeding and handling of livestock exhibits and area around exhibits. Exhibits inspected daily and premiums will be withheld if exhibit has not received proper care.

# DOG RALLY CLASSES

#### RALLY RULES FOR HANCOCK COUNTY FAIR

Rally is a sport in which the dog and handler complete a course that has been designed by the judge. The judge tells the handler when to begin, and the dog and handler proceed at a brisk pace through a course of designated stations, 10-20 depending on level. The dog and handler team moves continuously at a brisk but normal pace with the dog under control at

the handler's left side. After the judges "forward" order, the team is on its own to complete the entire sequence of numbered signs correctly. Unless otherwise specified in Rally Regulations, handlers are permitted to talk, praise, encourage, give additional commands and or signals using one or both arms, clap their hands, pat their legs or use any other verbal means of encouragement. The handler must move in a natural manner. The handler's arms need not be maintained in any particular position. At any time during the performance loud or harsh commands, intimidating signals, and touching the dog will be penalized.

## Rally Novice A & B

Novice A is for the exhibitor that has never shown in Rally and may only be shown in 1 year.

Novice B is for the exhibitor that has had previous experience showing/competing in Rally. There is no limit to how many years exhibitor is allowed to show in Novice B. It is up to advisor and exhibitor whether teams should move up to Rally Intermediate.

## Rally Novice A & B Rules:

All exercises are judged on leash. All dogs enter, show, and exit arena on leash. Must have 10-15 stations (Start and Finish not included) with a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 5 stationary exercises per class.

## Rally Intermediate A & B

Intermediate A is for the exhibitor that has never shown in Rally Intermediate level and may only be shown 1 year.

Intermediate B is for the exhibitor that has previously shown in Rally Intermediate A and is therefor ready to move up to harder stations. There is no limit to years shown in Rally Intermediate B. It is up to advisor and exhibitor if teams should move up to Rally Advanced.

## Intermediate Rally A & B Rules:

All exercises judged on leash. Must have 12-17 signs with a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 7 stationary signs. Intermediate courses will have a minimum of 3 Advanced signs. No jumps in this class.

# Rally Advanced A & B

Advanced A is for the exhibitor that has never shown in Rally Advanced and may only be shown 1 year.

Advanced B is for the exhibitor that has previously shown in Rally Advanced A and is therefor ready to move up to a more difficult class. No limit to years shown in Rally Advanced B. It is up to advisor and exhibitor if teams should move to next division.

# Advanced Rally Rules A & B

All Rally Advanced classes are shown off leash. All dogs must enter and exit the arena on leash. Rally Advanced must have 12-17 stations with a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 7 stationary exercises per class. Courses shall have a minimum of 3 Advanced level stations plus one required jump per class.

#### Rally Excellent Rules

All exercises are judged off leash. Rally Excellent must have 15-20 stations with a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 7 stationary exercises. The dog is required to jump twice utilizing 1 or 2 jumps. Courses shall have a minimum of 2 Advanced level stations and a maximum of 3 Excellent stations, plus 2 required jumps and the Sit Stay sign. Handlers are not permitted to clap or pat legs to encourage dogs. Verbal encouragement and multiple commands is allowed. Sit Stay Exercise: judge designates a place or person in charge of leash prior to walk-through, all exhibitors must be informed where to retrieve their leash. Immediately following the Finish sign the handler must command the dog to "sit stay", handler will then walk at least 15 feet, retrieve leash return to heel position by walking behind dog, and wait until judge gives command "exercise complete".

# Scoring/Timing:

All dogs will be timed, times will be used in events of tie for placements.

# incorrectly performed (IP) stations:

A team that fails to perform principal parts of station on first attempt. The handler may choose to retry the station once for a correct performance, accepting the mandatory 3-point deduction for the retry of the station.

#### Handler Error:

Can be assessed from 1-10 points up to Maximum Point Deductions. Handler errors can be assessed at any station or during movement between stations on a course. Once a handler has stopped on any halt exercise, the handler cannot move their feet to assist a dog without incurring a handler error.

# **RULES**

- 1. Exhibitors must have possession by June 1st.
- 2. No shared dogs are allowed. One (1) dog = one (1) exhibitor.

- 3. All dogs participating in the Hancock County Fair shall be immunized against distemper, adenovirus, parainfluenza, paravovirus, coronavirus, bordetella, leptospirosis, and rabies. As proof: all exhibitors must have a State 4-H Certificate of Vaccination submitted to the Extension Office no later than July 1st.
- 4. Mixed breed dogs are allowed. Dogs need not be purebred or AKC registered to show in the Junior Fair Dog Show or State Fair Dog Show.
- 5. Females in season will not be exhibited. [This decision will be made by the show officials, and/or a veterinarian, and is final.] Members with dogs in season will complete their project by attending the show and participating in an interview with the judge at the fair.
- 6. Dogs will be allowed on the Fairgrounds only one hour before the show and 30 minutes after the show concludes. Each exhibitor must carry their walk pass with them and must remain in the area of the show with their dog. Dogs are not permitted on the midway or in the food concession area.
- Exhibitors are expected to clean-up after their dogs. [Pooper-scoopers will be available.]
- 8. Dogs must be under control at all times. Exhibitor is responsible for maintaining complete control over his/her dog. Non controlled dogs may be disqualified.
- Dogs should have a collar and separate six (6) foot leather leash. Chain leashes are
  not permitted. All dogs must be kept on a leash while on the fairgrounds except
  while participating in the ring during judging.
- 10. Collars: no prong/pinch, electric collar device, or muzzle is allowed on dogs while on fairgrounds or training sessions.
- 11. Dogs may be kenneled in areas designated by the Superintendents. [Check at registration table for location of these areas.]
- 12. A qualified judge will be in-charge of the judging.
- 13. The judge may combine classes when it is appropriate due to small class sizes.

  Example: Senior Showmanship B & Senior Showmanship A may show at the same time but exhibitors will be judged and receive their placing according to the class the exhibitor is entered in.
- 14. Only the exhibitor can train the project dog at any type of training class during the project year.
- 15. No one other than the junior fair exhibitor is permitted to show the project dog at any type of dog show, including agility, field trials, rally trials, AKC show, etc. during the project year.
- 16. All exhibitors must bring to Show:

a. Copy of Dog License. All dogs must be currently licensed in their county of residence. Both the license certificate and tag must be presented at registration.

# 17. Exhibitors:

- a. Exhibitors must abide by the Junior Fair Rules and Regulations.
- All Dog Obedience and Grooming & Handling Exhibitors must complete the Skillathon or Make- Up Skillathon prior to the fair and attend Quality Assurance.
- c. All Junior Fair Exhibitors must be responsible for the grooming on their own dog.

## 18. Requirements for Show Classes:

- a. All Junior Fair Exhibitors taking Dog Obedience or Grooming & Handling may exhibit those projects only by participating in the Dog Show.
- b. Obedience exhibitors may enter only one (1) dog in a class. If exhibitor has two (2) dogs in their project, they may enter each in a different class.
- c. Grooming & Handling is limited to one (1) entry per exhibitor. [The same dog may also be shown in Obedience.]
- d. Handlers participating in the Graduate Open Class will provide their own equipment for use in scent discrimination and scent retrieve.
- e. Prior Winners of Sub Novice B, Novice B, and Open B, must compete at the next level if showing the same dog
- f. Dogs that have completed their Companion Dog (CD or equivalent) must show in Graduate Novice Classes.
- g. Dogs that have completed their Companion Dog Excellent (CDX or equivalent) must be in Open B or Graduate Open A.

# Misbehavior and Excusals for Dogs on the Fairgrounds, Show Area, or in the Show Ring

- 1. Any dog exhibiting unsafe or threatening behavior at any time befoe, during or exhibition MUST be removed from the fairgrounds and will not be permitted to return at any time throughout the Dog Show. Determination of the show committee and/or judge will be final.
- 2. The judge or show officials will immediately excuse from the ring any dog exhibiting unsafe or threatening behavior.
- a. The judge will immediately excuse any dog that appears dangerous to other dogs or exhibitors.

b. Any dog that snaps, bites, or attempts to bite any person or dog while in show ring will immediately be excused.

c. If a judge determines that a bitch in the ring is in season or appears to be attractive to males as to be a disturbing element, the bitch is immediately excused. The judge shall not obtain the opinion of the health check officials

SO

- 3. Any uncontrolled behavior such as barking, running away from its handler, etc., will be penalized according to the seriousness of the misbehavior, whether it occurs during or between exercises, or before or after judging.
- 4. Any dog not under its handler's control may be excused from competition.

# **Unsportsmanlike Conduct**

- 1. Any exhibitor or other person(s) abusing a dog will be removed from the fairgrounds.
- 2. The judge or show officials will dismiss from the ring any exhibitor abusing the which will result in disqualification of exhibitor and removal from the fairgrounds.

- 3. Judges and/or show officials have the right to deduct points from the Sportsmanship category on the exhibitor's score sheet if unsportsmanlike conduct is displayed at any time throughout the 4-H dog show prior to or during judging.
- 4. Judges and/or show officials have the right to disqualify any participant exhibiting poor sportsmanship at any time throughout the 4-H Dog Show from showing, participating in activities, or from receiving any awards.
- 5. Any handler who willfully interferes with another competitor or that competitor's dog will be excused from competition.
- 6. Exhibitors, parents, volunteers, and other individuals verbally and/or physically abusive or threatening to show personnel will be removed from the Fairgrounds, and exhibitors will be disqualified.
- 7. Show officials have the right to order the removal from the Fairgrounds anyone showing unsportsmanlike conduct.

8. Exhibitors must check in at their show ring within 15 minutes after being called to their ring. Exhibitors who do not check in at their show ring within 15 minutes after being called will have sportsmanship points deducted on their score sheets.

- 4. If a team knocks a bar it does not count towards required obstacle.
- 5. The teams only get credit for the obstacles they preform correctly.
- 6. Maximum Course Time is 60 Seconds

Fair Classes & Descriptions – Standard classes and one game will be offered each year consisting of the following divisions: On-lead, Level 1, Level 2, and Level 3. Exhibitors competing in agility venues outside of 4-H should enter corresponding levels. Exhibitors and dogs BOTH must be proficient in class levels/descriptions entered. Example #1; you (exhibitor are confident with sending your dog through the weave poles (appropriate command & timing), however, your dog is not able to successfully complete the weave poles. You would enter class Level 1 or lower. Example #2; Your dog is familiar and fully capable of performing the teeter, however you (exhibitor) are not confident in giving a command with proper timing which would ensure a safe contact off the teeter. For this example, you would enter Level 2 or lower. Intent of this rule is for the exhibitor and dog to show as a team and safely perform in their class. Dogs and handlers may remain in any class level for as long as they like. However, once a class placement has been earned, they cannot move back to a lower level class, unless health/safety reasons become a factor.



- 1. Buckeye Pedal Pullers General Rules for Pedal Tractor Pull-in The Event will be for ages 4-12 years old.
- 2. \*\*\*Never use weight classes. It is an unethical practice.
- 3. 12-year-old competitors on the day of the pull may participate, but are not eligible for State qualification if 13 before the National Pull in late September.
- 4. Competitors will enter the division they are the day of the pedal pull, including State and National. State and National will require proof of age and proper sanctioning paper work from lower meets.
- 5. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group.
- 6. Rules of Conduct by Participants:
- 7. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
- 8. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push the tractor forward. C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they cannot hesitate or absolutely never jerk the equipment.

- 9. The child will remain in the seat at all times. If a contestant lifts off the seat the pull will be stopped and their distance will be measured to that point.
- 10. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet. (We would suggest tie or Velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction on the pedal.)
- 11. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent, or guardian will not be allowed and could result in disqualification of the contestant. We will display sportsmanship in all cases and should that not be possible the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect, but we will handle things in the proper way.
- 12. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need a sled may be re-weighted and the group may start over.
- 13. Sanctioning: In Ohio the Sanctioned pull will qualify the top three in each age division 4-11.
- 14. These are general rules and each puller may have slight variations. Yet again in general these are the rules one should see at State and National competition.
